*“Jesus asked, “What is the kingdom of God like? What shall I compare it to? It is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his garden. It grew and became a tree, and the birds perched in its branches.” (Luke 13, 18&19)*

In the previous Bishop's Post I shared thoughts on the theme of Synod: Enough is a feast.

At synod we spend a good deal of time reflecting on this topic. One thing that struck me is that sometimes even small groups (like our Church) or a small number of people (like the disciples of Jesus) can have a major impact on the world and on history.

To use an illustration: Termite mounds, or ant hills easily reach heights of two to three metres, some can be as high as nine. These huge structures were built grain by grain by millions of ants. Each ant on it's own would hardly have had an impact. But all their efforts put together resulted in a magnificent structure.

No single one of us can solve the hunger issue, the high rate of unemployment, corruption, prejudice etc. But each one of us can “carry a grain of sand” at a time. Each one of us can, where God has placed us, live as Christians, perhaps help a child through school, teach an illiterate person to read, and refuse to be part of lies and corruption. On it's own it will not be noticed. But if fellow Christians join in with their “grain of sand” it will have an impact.

Two thousand years ago a child was born to poor parents in an animal shelter. Today more than two billion people worship this Christ as Saviour. Jesus, with the parable of the mustard seed, emphasised this “power of the insignificant” in his kingdom.

Do therefore not underestimate your role, your “grain of sand” as you follow Christ! Why not do something special this Christmas? In stead of giving expensive gifts to your loved ones, give something smaller, ideally self made. And then look around to see whether you can use what you have saved, to bring joy or relief to a person that would otherwise have been overlooked. One grain of sand - perhaps multiplied by 10 000 who do the same?

May you (and others through you!) have a blessed Christmas, and then a good start in 2014!
